Reception

In Literacy, we introduced the story "Owl Babies," which aligns with our topic of light and dark. The children actively participated in the storytelling by acting out the narrative using story map They engaged in labelling captions, answering comprehension questions, and identifying rhyming words within the story, such as "mice" and "nice," as mentioned by the character Sarah.

We also connected the story to Personal, Social, Health, and Citizenship Education (PSHCE). The plot revolves around three baby owls who wake up to find their mother missing, which prompted discussions about feelings and emotions. We referred to the 'colour monsters' to help children articulate how they might feel in that situation. Questions such as, "What would you think, if your mummy wasn't there?" and "Where could she be?" encouraged them to express their thoughts and feelings. This led to an important lesson on safety, emphasising the need to inform a staff member or parent if they need to leave designated area.



In Science and Understanding the World, we explored the concept of nocturnal animals those that are active at night. The children learned about animals that come out after dark and were introduced to the vocabulary word "diurnal" to contrast with nocturnal animals. We discussed various facts about nocturnal creatures, including their habitats, as described in our story.

The children created homes for owls using materials such as leaves, feathers, and twigs, reinforcing their understanding of the natural world and the environments in which these animals live.

Reception

In our Science sessions, we conducted a hands-on experiment where the children created glowing stars using glow-in-thedark materials. This activity allowed them to explore the concepts of light and dark interactively. They discussed the differences between day and night and learned new vocabulary words such as "light," "dark," "glow," "shine," "bright," and "dim." The children observed how the glow-in-the-dark stars emitted light after being exposed to a light source, learning that light can be absorbed and later released in the dark.



The children noted the need to start wearing warmer clothes and expressed excitement about the snow that arrived this week. They had the opportunity to go outside and experience the snow firsthand, which added to their enjoyment and understanding of seasonal changes.

Year One & Two

This week in Year 1/2, the children have been engaged in a variety of exciting learning activities. In English, they completed their reading, writing, and problem-solving assessments and began learning how to plan and prepare their own stories. In maths, the children focused on addition and subtraction. Year 1 students worked on adding and subtracting within 10, while Year 2 students practiced adding and subtracting two-digit numbers with regrouping and compared number sentences. In geography, the children enjoyed creating their own treasure maps, and in history, they learned about Walter Tull and discussed why he is an important historical figure. In science, we explored the polar habitat and examined how animals adapt to survive in extreme conditions. In art, children created and decorated wonderful Christmas ornaments and cards. A highlight of the week was a special livestream with the London Museum, where the children learned about the Great Fire of London in an interactive and engaging way.









Year Three





This week the Year 3 children have been busy completing assessments in Maths and English. They did a GL Assessment NGRT Reading Test, a CAT4 test online, a Ros Wilson Writing Assessment and also a 9+ Maths paper! On Tuesday they had a wonderful visit to the Apple Store in Brent Cross where they learned how to use the "Garage Band" app. The session was very practical, and the children enjoyed making their own music.

In Science this week the children have been learning about push and pull. They discussed many examples and then completed a worksheet to show their understanding.

In P4C this week, Year 3 explored the question "If you could choose just one thing to change about the world, what would it be?" It was great to see them involved and articulating their reasons for their choices.

Firstly, we did our reading, maths, and writing assessments. The students worked very hard on a range of tasks and should all feel very good after a long week of challenging work.

Year 4 also had some field trips this week: on Tuesday, we visited the Apple Store in Brent Cross to learn about Garage Band. We made some great songs!

Some Year 4s also had field trips on Wednesday and Thursday: on Wednesday, the Year 4 members of the Debate Club went to a Debate Competition in South Hampstead. On Thursday, some Year 4s were selected for the Buxlow football team to play in the ILG Football Tournament. They performed fantastically in both events, and they should be very proud of their efforts!

In Maths, we worked on short multiplication and deepening our conceptual understanding of what multiplication is. Take a look at all the representations we can use to explain multiplication!

In English, we have found how the structure of Finding Tales are organised, and we will use that to plan our own Finding Tales next week.







Year Five

Another busy week for us! Year 5 completed their assessments early on and spent the rest of the week doing lots of cross-curricular and creative work.

A highlight was continuing our coding work, where some of us were able to create our own music tunes through blocks of code! It was challenging but a lot of fun.

We wrote stories based on the story 'Dobber and the Silver Ring' which really showed an improved understanding of how stories are structured. We might make a book out of them...

A combined Art/RE afternoon saw us begin to make decorations celebrating both Hanukkah and Christmas. This prompted interesting discussions about a range of festivals celebrated during the winter.

We applied our knowledge of statistics by conducting a survey of how Buxlow staff and pupils get to school as part of our Eco Curriculum. We then used iPad programmes to turn these into comparative charts. We then looked at another way of sharing information by creating word clouds based on some of Ms Stanton's most used phrases... well, at least we think we're hilarious!

This was the first time that they had taken part in such a competition and Mrs. McLelland says they represented the school very well. The two teams participated in 3 debates to **prop** or **opp** a range of topics They did a brilliant job and were so polite throughout, despite the high tension. Congratulations to all four of them, and the other members of Debate Club, for taking part. "**POI!"**

On Thursday, Year 6 took part in an ILG Football competition in Hounslow. All of the Year 6 children were invited to take part, as well as a few other children from Key Stage 2. The children played three matches in total but unfortunately lost all three. They tried their best but were outplayed by stronger teams. Well done to all of them for taking part.


Philosophy 4 Children
