In English, we continued our exploration of the story "Whatever Next!" The children practiced vocabulary introduced in the story and used it to retell the plot in their own words, utilising a story map that we created as a class. This activity not only reinforced comprehension but also enhanced their ability to articulate thoughts and ideas.

To deepen their engagement, we encouraged the children to imagine if they were the bear, where they would like to go whether it be a park, on a train, or to the zoo. They created a list of items they would take for their chosen adventure, practicing their phonetic sounds to label these items using word mats. This exercise nurtured their writing skills and vocabulary development, making the learning process both fun and relevant.

Linking to the story, the children engaged in an **expressive arts** project where they used various materials to create their own rockets—like the bear's rocket to the moon. This creative activity fostered their imagination and fine motor skills, and they later utilised the rockets in the role-play area, reenacting scenes from the story.

In mathematics, we consolidated the

concepts of 2-D shapes, specifically circles and triangles. We then transitioned to describing positions using positional language such as "in," "on," "under," and "over." The children participated in playful activities with teddy bears, placing them in different positions around the classroom and giving each other directions. This hands-on approach helps them grasp spatial awareness and language skills.

We also listened to the story "We're Going on a Bear Hunt," which reinforces positional language and the concept of a journey. Additionally, we introduced the numbers four and five, focusing on subitising these numbers—recognising them at a glance. The children explored different ways to represent four and five, ensuring they are confident in verbalising the numbers and matching them to their respective quantities.

Using picture cards, the children sorted representations of four and five into appropriate hoops, reinforcing their understanding of number concepts. They also enjoyed a game where they ordered picture cards from one to five by playing hide and seek with the cards, which enhanced their number recognition and sequencing skills.

Reception

Understanding the World

This week, we commemorated Remembrance Day by discussing its significance. The children learned that it is a time to remember those who protected us during the war. To represent this, we created poppy biscuits and made handprints to symbolise Poppy Day. This activity fostered their understanding of history and the importance of remembrance, while also engaging them in creative expression.

In addition, we participated in Anti-Bullying Week with a focus on respect. The children engaged in discussions about what bullying is and how we can show kindness and respect. They wore odd socks to school to symbolise our differences and how we should respect each other. They also created their own odd socks, which encouraged creativity and reinforced the theme of acceptance.

Further exploring the theme of Light and Dark, the children investigated different sources of light around the school. They learned to differentiate between events that occur during the day and at night, such as waking up for breakfast, going to school, and enjoying bedtime stories. This exploration nurtured their observational skills and understanding of the world around them.





In **French**, the children are learning to name some pets. They have learned the dog, the cat, the rabbit and the fish so far. Le chien, le chat, le lapin, le poisson.

We've had a busy and exciting week in Year 1!

This week in English, the children have been retelling the classic tale of Goldilocks and the Three Bears in their own words. Using the key vocabulary, we focused on last week; they've been building their storytelling skills while practising sentence structure. The children have been using their Super Sentences Checklist to ensure their writing includes capital letters, finger spaces, full stops, and neat handwriting.

In Maths, Year 1 have been working on addition and subtraction using Cuisenaire rods. The children have been exploring how different rods represent different values and have been building their own number sentences with them. They have been solving problems independently and applying their understanding of numbers in a hands-on way.

In P4C this week, we focused on the question 'is it better to be a child or an adult?'. It was interesting to hear their responses and how they thought about this question!

Year Two

This week in Year 2, we've had a wonderful time learning across various subjects.

In maths, we worked on adding two-digit numbers with and without regrouping and subtracting two-digit numbers without regrouping.

In English, we continued reading *Roald Dahl's The Enormous Crocodile*, summarizing the section about the animals he meets, and explored the story *Pippety Skycap* by creating story maps, role-playing, and imagining new adventures for the mischievous character.

In art, the children crafted festive Christmas ornaments out of salt dough.

For science, we explored our local habitat, learning about the plants and animals in our environment.

Geography lessons focused on mapping the five oceans and seven continents, while in history, we discussed the importance of Remembrance Day and wrote thoughtful letters to honor our brave soldiers. It's been a fun and engaging week full of learning!











Year Three

We have had a busy week in Year 3. In Maths the children completed some revision activities on addition and subtraction to secure their knowledge and started a new topic: Multiplication and Division. They have been learning the technique to develop a written method to multiply TU by U showing their working out.

In English, the children have been developing their skills to write instructions. They rearranged statements on how to make a jam sandwich. They used their knowledge and understanding of the features of instructions and wrote their own set of instructions for recipe.

Our PSHEE lesson and P4C lesson this week had the focus of antibullying week them of **Choose Respect**. In PSHEE, we had a class discussion on respect and the children created posters. We explored the question "Can you respect someone even if you don't agree with them?" in P4C which initiated an interesting discussion and the children agreed together that you can respect someone even if you don't agree with them, with really good reasoning.

Year 3 were really proud of their stained-glass poppies that they made in their art lesson for Remembrance Day.

Year Three French


In French, Year 3 have been revising their numbers to 20 and their spellings. They will be counting to 31 and naming the months of the year in order to ask and say their birthdays. They played a fun game of guess my number and a lotto game to practise their recall.



Year Four

- In Year 4, we started the week off by finishing our Remembrance Day wreaths so that we could place them in the middle of our Remembrance Day moment of silence. It was lovely to see them flex their creative muscles!
- In maths, we have been working on solving addition and subtraction word problems by using bar models to visualise the structure of the maths hidden in a word problem.
- In English, we have been learning our new story the King of the Horses and practising our dialogue. We have also had some interesting discussions and games to help understand the characters' motivations and desires in the story! You can see one pupil at the front of the room listening to teams of 2 trying to convince him to let him use their wish.
- In Science, we have been investigating how simple circuits work. It was very tricky to figure out how this works!
- In PSHE, Mr Smith very valiantly underwent a significant lifestyle change (growing a moustache) to create a discussion about the value and effects of saying things without thinking and understanding the unintended consequences of offhand comments.





Year Five

Another busy week in Year 5! In English we explored the characterisation of Bilbo, the lead character in our class reader (The Hobbit). We also completed an 11+ Maths paper in pairs and analysed it. This was on top of our core subject topic work on Found Object stories and Statistics.

In Science we explored how taking cuttings can help plants to reproduce and began the design process for a felt phone case in DT. RE met the 11+ as we completed a comprehension text about Hanukkah, ahead of our upcoming project on winter festivals.

To mark Anti-Bullying Week, we explored Anti-Racism in PSHEE and created designs for awareness ribbons. It was great to explore our similarities and differences and how we are all amazing regardless!

P4C saw us continue to explore the questions we devised about our world. We were joined by Mrs McLelland - what a great discussion!


Year Six
