
## Reception -Amazing Farm Animals



We are excited to share the wonderful learning experiences and progress made by the children in Reception this week. Despite it being a short week, the children have been actively engaged in hands – on activities that have enriched their educational journey.

### <u>English</u>

In our non-fiction studies, the children have been exploring the fascinating world of animals. They selected four farm animals: sheep, cow, chicken, and pig – to learn about. Through investigating their physical features, habitats, diets, and interesting facts, the children have expanded their understanding of the natural world and honed their exploration skills. Their writing skills have flourished as they can construct sentences, segment words, and identify sounds independently to complete their fact files.



Reception Cont.d...

In science, the children have been actively categorising animals into herbivores and carnivores, showcasing their excellent sorting abilities. They have also explored various methods of animal classification, including by size, camouflage, different types of water animals, and safari zoo mini.

In mathematics, the focus has been on introducing the concepts of odd and even numbers. The children have spent this week in engaging in practical activities and learning different strategies to comprehend and apply mathematical terms effectively.

Reception - Cont.d...

During **reading time**, the children have immersed themselves in exploring diverse animal books, expanding their knowledge and fostering a love for reading.

In **phonics**, the children have been consolidating phase 3 digraphs to ensure they can confidently segment and read phonemes and graphemes independently and with confidence.

To enhance fine motor skills, the children have been learning to draw animals' step by step, boosting their confidence and dexterity. As a delightful conclusion to our animal project, Ms. Ghezaal from the nursery, a talented artist, has been painting the children's faces with their favorite animal designs, adding a creative and fun touch to our learning journey.



This week in year 1, children began a new unit in maths on measuring length. They used cubes to estimate, compare, and measure items of different lengths. Later in the week, they went on to add lengths and find the difference between lengths.

In English, children learned about grammar and spelling rules and exceptions. They changed singular nouns into plural nouns, as well as, added "ed" and "ing" to the end of verbs.


In history, children continued their study on castles and knights by learning about how castles and knights defended themselves during an attack/ siege. In art, they then created castles out of clay.

In Science this week, Year 2 explored the fascinating topic of plant growth and seed dispersal. They had a hands-on experience as they went on a hunt for sycamore seeds and analysed them. It was a wonderful opportunity for them to understand the importance of seed dispersal in the natural world.

In English, Year 2 showcased their creativity and language skills by writing their own innovative stories based on "The Tiny Seed." They demonstrated an impressive range of high-level vocabulary and brought their stories to life with vivid and detailed descriptions. They also had the opportunity to write their final versions using a handwriting pen!

In Maths, they are revisiting 2D and 3D shapes. Specifically, Year 2 delved into the properties of shapes and were focusing on evaluating their differences and similarities. This allowed them to develop a deeper understanding of geometric concepts.







Year 3 confidently hit the ground running after the Bank Holiday, going straight into application of the '*bus stop*' division method in Maths and working very hard to memorise the required steps.

In English the children have been drafting recounts of our trip to the Mandir from earlier in the term. Not only are we making sure we use all the relevant features of a recount, we are also pushing ourselves to use our individual writing targets so we can really impress!

Another highlight was exploring the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb across a range of subjects – looking at original sources in History, writing diaries in role in English, sketching famous artifacts in Art and even discussing a fictionalised version of the story in 'Secrets of a Sun King' during Guided Reading. We have really enjoyed this immersion.

Year 4

In Maths this week we have been looking at the lines of symmetry. Year 4 have been using mirrors to draw the lines of symmetry on different types of shapes.

In English we have continued with our 11+ preparation, Year 4 have been focusing on annotating the text and learning how to retrieve the correct information. They have been reading together and discussing with their peers which has helped them to understand.

Geography was focused on researching and identifying the famous rivers in the World and finding facts about each of the rivers.

There were interesting discussions in class during History relating to how and why the Romans invaded Britain. The children worked collaboratively and were able to create a timeline.







This week, in science, Year 5 finished their research about different types of bridges, using their iPads. They also collated their selected facts and pictures in presentations that they made on their iPads, in either Book Creator or Key Note. The children then screen-mirrored their presentations to the classroom screen and presented their findings to the rest of the class. Over the coming weeks, we will be looking at the science and engineering behind how bridges work and their different designs.

The class are working very hard on the 11+ preparation. There have been some outstanding results recently, including Toma achieving 100% in a maths paper this week. The class also moved up to a higher level of mental maths, which is testament to their hard work and improvement.

Ms O'Gara has also created a wonderful Latin display in our classroom, showcasing their written work and the research that the class have done





We are focussing more and more on the production. We now have separate practices for scenes, song and dances: Oh my!


In Maths, we are looking at graphs, having started with line graphs this week. Take a look at some of the working out we need to do!

In English, we have started to practise switching between formal and informal tone. We have written formal letters, and we will start to create dialogue that involves interaction between more and less formal characters.

We have been investigating a lot of properties of light in science: we had a very cool investigation of refraction this week, that was magical!

Finally, we are just loving the sunny weather we have been having. The students are taking full advantage of it!

We are looking forward to pushing ourselves further and will now be sending you an Eco themed challenge each week in the Buxlow Bulletin.


<u>This week's challenge</u>: As you travel to school, count how many different types of tree you can see. How many did you spot? Why is it good to have lots of different species of plant around us?
