- Creativity, originality and initiative

- Reasoning and ideation

## Introducing Philosophy for Children P4C

P4C is a philosophical approach to learning and teaching that enables students to think with others and to think for themselves and gives them a wonderful sense of agency.

P4C encourages teachers and pupils to think in a caring, collaborative, creative and critical way and develops the skills, attitudes and dispositions for higher level thinking:

- Ability to work with others
- Builds communication skills
- Raises self esteem
- Develops social responsibility
- Promotes respect and understanding
- Develops reasoning skills
- Promotes logical, critical and reflective thinking

## What does a P4C session look like?

#### Generating a philosophical question:

After the children have had time to investigate a given stimulus individually, with a partner and as a class, they then have to generate a question. The children are encouraged to develop their skills at developing a philosophical question,

They learn to understand which type of questions generate a good enquiry and which provide a very closed line of enquiry.

Closed question: What colour is Goldilocks dress?

Philosophical question: Can it ever be right to break into somebody's house?

#### Deciding on a line of enquiry

After generating their questions the pupils have the agency to choose which question they want to discuss. The children vote for the line of enquiry they wish to develop.

#### Discussion

The children then discuss the question. They listen to each other, share ideas, agree, disagree, build upon each others' ideas and all have to the chance to contribute. Completing the enquiry

After a set period of time the enquiry will be brought to a close and the facilitator (the teacher) will recap on the ideas covered and discussed.




Reception



This week, your child has been engaged in a variety of stimulating activities that have not only been enjoyable but hav also provided numerous benefits for their learning and development.

This week in our **English lessons**, we have been exploring the children's classic "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," where the caterpillar enjoys a variety of foods before transforming into a butterfly. The children have been practicing their writing skills by creating recounts of different parts of the story, focusing on constructing sentences accurately. This activity has reinforced their understanding of days of the week and different types of food, building upon their learning from the previous term.

In our **Expressive Art** sessions, the children have been using fruits and vegetables to create pictures inspired by the story. This task has encouraged creativity and imaginations and also allowed them to express themselves artistically. Can you guess which part of the story they have depicted through their artwork?



Reception Cont.d

In Maths the children have been learning about doubling through practical activities using manipulatives. They have been exploring the concept of doubling as combining two groups of the same number to find the total. Additionally, they are practicing writing number sentences, such as understanding that the double of 2 is 2+2=4.

Creating a caterpillar in **Arts and Craft**, along with writing a speech bubble for it, has given the children the opportunity to engage in imaginative play and storytelling. This activity promotes language development, critical thinking, and social interaction as they share their ideas with others.

In French, we talked about the French version of the Very Hungry Caterpillar to link with our English topic. In French, it is called "La chenille qui fait des trous" (which means the caterpillar who makes holes). Scan the QR code to hear the few simple sentences we recorded.





This week in Year 1, children focused on writing their own comic book stories. They invented unique superheroes with special

super powers, as well as, an evil arch enemy. They concentrated on writing stories with a beginning, middle, and end.

In Maths, children began a new unit on money. They learned to add amounts together, as well as, to subtract in order to find change from 20p. In addition, they worked on identifying different ways to give change.

Well done to Mohammed and Javon for participating in our school's talent show! They did a wonderful job hopping on one leg!





Year 2 have been diving into the world of mythical creatures and honing their instructional writing skills. The children took on the exciting task of creating their very own mythical creatures and crafting instructional pieces about them. Using command verbs, they gave accurate instructions on how to care for and interact with their unique creatures. In Maths, they have been revising fractions and division. Year 2 have been exploring how these two concepts work together and understanding the concept of using them together to solve questions.




In French, Year 2 practised their basic questions (name, age and where they live). Scan the QR code to hear their conversations.














Year 3 have been hard at work this week, developing their knowledge of fractions ahead of assessment week. They have focused on fractions adding to one whole and ensuring they can give full, developed answers to reasoning questions.


In English we have started a lovely new topic on syllabic poetry. This week we have written traditional Haiku and Tanka poems about our school and wider location, building up to writing longer form poems next week.

Elsewhere the children have achieved well across the range of subjects. They have enjoyed a lot of discussion about our class reader, Secrets of a Sun King, and were astonished to realise the double meaning behind the title!

In Science the children have planned an investigation into healthy plant growth, which we will set up next week. The children are really looking forward to it!



### In French, Year 3 wrote a description of a monster, using a variety of vocabulary such as numbers, body parts and colours.

Year 4

In Maths this week, Year 4 have been revisiting place value, addition, subtraction, division and multiplication. They have also started learning about perimeters and calculating the perimeter of different 2D shapes.

In English, it was the first to complete a comprehension paper and a writing paper under exam conditions. The children did well as it was a challenging task for them. The writing paper had 6 choices, it was interesting to read their responses as the task involved writing essays with their own views.


The STEM project of building a vehicle in Science revealed a new turn, the children managed to progress and became more confident working in their groups, however, it will require another lesson to complete the project.


We had a question-and-answer session with the current Year 5 students. The Year 4s had many intriguing questions about Year 5 and what they should expect. Year 5s did a fantastic job answering the questions and giving insight to what is expected in Year 5.











In French, Year 5 acted out some conversations about pets, describing them with adjectives such as colours and character. Scan the QR code to hear their conversations.

The class continue to excel in Maths. They have all progressed onto a higher level of mental Maths (**again**) and they are also doing very well with the ISEB 11+ Maths Papers, which they did some collaborative work on this week.

The highlight of the week has to be the Buxlow Talent Show, that took place on Friday morning in the playground. There were some truly outstanding performances from Year 5. Everyone in the class performed something!! Congratulations to everyone for taking part but in particular to Toma though who was crowned the overall winner of the whole competition, with his standout Grade 5 performance on the piano. Well done, Toma!



In English, we have returned to story writing, focusing on using formal and informal register in our dialogue. We have also focused on how dialogue uses conflict to drive the plot forward as well as reveal hidden layers of each speaker's characterisation.

In Maths, we have prepared for Assessment Week by revising fraction calculations and reasoning as well as measurement conversions and word problems. They have worked extremely hard in these sessions, and they appreciated the opportunity to revisit these areas of Maths that we had not seen in some time!

In History, we have started a research project into the Benin Empire. The students had the choice between researching either the religion, art or monarchy in the Benin Empire. This will also be an opportunity to further master their use of the Keynote app on their iPads, which involves creating slideshows that they will eventually present to the rest of the class.

We have also been making some time to flex our creative juices as well: not only are we still diligently working on our summer production, but we have also made time to create and interpret our own quickfire abstract art. It is very challenging but fun!

Finally, we have just had our Talent Show this week: congratulations to all the Year 6s who took part and shared their talents! A very special shout-out as well to Kiana, who won joint-third place!

We are looking forward to pushing ourselves further and will now be sending you an Eco themed challenge each week in the Buxlow Bulletin.


